

Venues & Accessibility

Hereford Cathedral allpay Stage & College Hall

The main body of Hereford Cathedral is wheelchair accessible. To help visitors plan their visit, our Access Map marks all the level, ramped, and stepped access points. The main North Porch entrance is level, as are the entrances from Chapter House Gardens and the Lady Arbour. There is a shallow ramp at the St John's door entrance, which is the entrance nearest the car park. Please note that the floor can be a little uneven in places. Hereford Town Hall -Selection Stage

There is an entrance at the back of the Town Hall, which is on ground level and has electric doors for access. There is a temporary manual stair lift which can be used to move wheelchairs up and down the stairs.

Green Dragon Hotel

The hotel can be accessed via the main entrance or the carriage entrance at the rear of the hotel. The doors from the rear car parks have three steps but a portable ramp can be laid upon request. The restaurant is situated on ground level and is accessible from the reception area or Broad Street. The Ballroom is located down steps but can be accessed via the carriage entrance.

Castle Green Pavilion

Recently refurbished, The Pavilion is fully accessible.

Travel & Timings

Train: Hereford is well connected to the national rail network. On arrival at Hereford Train Station, it is just a 20 minute walk to Hereford City.

Coach: National Express coaches run nationwide services. Travel from London Victoria and Birmingham to Hereford. To book your journey call National Express Customer Contact Centre on 08717 818 181.

Car: The principal roads to Hereford are the A49 from Ludlow and Shrewsbury to the north and Gloucester and Ross-on-Wye to the south, the A465 from South Wales and the A4103 from Worcester to the east. The nearest motorway connection is Junction 4 on the M50 (14 miles), which connects to the M5.

Parking: See map on page 24 for car parks in Hereford.



Hereford Cathedral | 1:00-2:00pm | £12








Deterring Armageddon




Patrick Baty: Artists Rifles

The Artists Rifles was perhaps the most curious regiment in the British Army. It was formed in 1860 by a group of painters, architects, poets, sculptors, musicians and actors concerned about the threat of a French invasion. The Pre-Raphaelites were early members as were William Morris and Frederic Leighton, and it was still the natural choice for such men in 1914, with artists like John and Paul Nash, the poets Edward Thomas and Wilfred Owen and the playwright Noël Coward joining the regiment. **Patrick Baty** takes us through the history of the regiment and explains how it became the SAS of today.




Ben Macintyre: The Siege




Poems of War and Life with Larry Lamb

Agent Zo, shortlisted for The Women's Prize for Non Fiction, tells the incredible story of courageous resistance fighter Elżbieta Zawacka, aka 'Zo'. The only woman to parachute from Britain into Nazi-occupied Poland, Zo not only established a crucial intelligence network and couriered microfilm across wartime borders while just one step ahead of the Gestapo, but also played a key role in the Warsaw Uprising. Imprisoned and silenced by the post-war Communist regime, Zo's remarkable story was kept hidden for over forty years. Chaired by Julia Wheeler.



Angharad Hampshire: The Mare

Shortlisted for The Walter Scott Prize for Historical Fiction 2025, *The Mare* is based on the true story of Hermine Braunsteiner, the first person to be extradited from America for Nazi War Crimes. Hermine worked as a female concentration camp guard and was nicknamed 'the Mare' by prisoners because she kicked people to death. After the war, she fled back to Austria and married an unsuspecting American man from whom she hid her past. **Angharad Hampshire** is in conversation with **Louise Savidge**.






Anna Reid: A Nasty Little War






Anne Sebba and Wendy Holden: Remarkable People of Auschwitz



The Living History Campsite will be open from 10am-4pm, Saturday and Sunday. Firing displays will be at 11:30 and 2:30 with scattered pike, sword and other demonstrations throughout the day. Come and see Sir Gilbert Hoghtons Regiment of foot, part of the Sealed Knot Society as we reenact the Royalist Garrison of Hereford in July 1645 just before the city was taken by an Army from Scotland. We will have a Living History Campsite on Castle Green with some weapons displays and talks happening throughout the weekend. Come on over and learn about the City's gloried past, try on some clothes, hold some weapons, maybe even have a go at some 17th Century Pike Drill.

Herefordshire Regiment

Open 11am-6pm daily with the exception of when events are taking place in the room

The Herefordshire Regiment was one of the Territorial Regiments created under the 1908 Haldane Army Reforms. Many members of the old Rifle Volunteers enlisted and the ranks were filled with local men. The Herefordshire Light Infantry Museum tells the story of these men. It is the story of a Volunteer Regiment from a small English county. A story of bravery, determination, and devotion to duty, of sadness of comrades lost, but also that of a job well done.

MOD Shipwrecks Exhibition

Castle Green Pavillion | Open 11am-6pm daily

The exhibition will showcase HMS CASSANDRA, a WWI era cruiser of the 6th Light Cruiser Squadron, which struck a mine and sank in the Baltic in December 1918. Following a detailed survey in June 2025 by the DE&S SALMO Wrecks team of the risk she presents (of polluting oil and chemicals from ammunition) the results, hot off the press, will be showcased here, alongside survivor's accounts of her sinking. Harriett Rushton and Matt Skellhorn will be available to answer your questions daily between 12-1pm & 3-4pm.

Laguna's Spitfire Legacy

High Town | All day Saturday 27th September

The Lagunas Spitfire Legacy display showcases some of the recovered parts of Mk Ilb Spitfire P8331 Sumatra which was flown by a number of well-known pilots from Polish No 303 Squadron, one of the most famous and high-scoring squadrons in the Battle of Britain. The team behind the restoration project plan to restore P8331 to flying condition and believe that its historical significance in terms of its rarity and links to No 303 Squadron make it one of the top three most important Spitfires in the world. Only 170 Mk Ilb Spitfires were built, and while three survive, none are in flying condition.


